# WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING AT HOSPICE

### **NEW HOSPICE WEBSITE**

### **VOLUNTARY ASSISTED DYING RESEARCH PROJECT**

The Hospice have partnered with the Rural Clinical School and UWA to undertake a research project focusing on Voluntary Assisted Dying and the Hospice. Voluntary Assisted Dying legislation was passed in Western Australia in December 2019 and will come into effect from 1 July 2021.

In August and September 2020, the research team held public consultation sessions for Hospice staff and volunteers and for the wider community to seek their input about the possible role of voluntary assisted dying at Hospice. The outcomes of these sessions have been analysed by the research team and a final report was presented to the Board in December. The findings from these sessions will provide a great resource to the Board in their decision-making about voluntary assisted dying at Hospice. ### PALLIATIVE CARE UPDATE SESSIONS

The Hospice held a Palliative Care Update Session hosted by Medical Advisory Committee Chairperson Associate Professor Kirsten Auret and Multi-Disciplinary Team Coordinator Dr Kristel Smit-Kroner, on November 1. The session featured updates from Regional Palliative Care specialist, Dr Sarah Pickstock, Palliative Care GP, Dr Jonathan Ramachenderan, and Psychiatrist, Dr Kelly Ridley. ### RECLINER CHAIR FUNDRAISER

This year the recliner chairs in each guests room reached the end of their serviceable life, no longer meeting safety and infection control standards. At a cost of \$2,650 each and needing over \$21,000 to replace 8 of them, the Hospice created an online fundraiser and immediately secured funding for two chairs - one from Great Southern Bingo and one from South Coast Insurance Brokers.

#### RETRAVISION SUPPLIES NEW FRIDGE



Patient centred care continues to be our focus as we serve the unique needs of each of our guests and their families along their end-of-life journey.




This year we were able to host a romantic dinner in the Good Spirit Room, family barbecues in the courtyard, special visits from furry friends and spiritual healing ceremonies.

# Did You Know?

From January - December 2020 the Hospice had over 146 patients. Of these patients 44% returned home after their stay with us.



The cost of a Hospice bed per day is \$1016 with a shortfall of over \$239 per bed per day resulting in the need to fundraise over \$200,000 per year.
